Have you ever watched an amazing presenter build a relationship, a connection, with their audience and wondered how they do it? This workshop focuses on how to give a good presentation rather than what makes a good one, can help you identify your authentic style and provides you with a set of practical tools with which to approach your next presentation.

We will go beyond superficial discussions of speaking pace, good eye contact, and adopting open body language to explore how you can use internal and external resources to create impact in your presentations. It releases you from many of the myths around public speaking and explores what we do intellectually, emotionally and physically when we communicate effectively.

"What got you here won't get you there." Successful completion of your doctorate may well require you to stop taking some aspects of your existing ways of working for granted. Working habits tend to accrete in haphazard ways, especially when we're under pressure, and it's easy for them to survive far longer than the benefits they offer to us or our work.

In this session, you'll turn a critical eye on your own routines and be introduced to ways of optimizing them. You'll reflect on the multiple roles your life involves and how these give rise to goals that matter to you, which in turn shape how you direct your time and energy into specific tasks and activities.

You'll join the dots between daily and weekly levels of tasks and projects, and your goals and roles for the PhD and beyond. The session will also include an excursion into feelings of academic failure and impostor syndrome how to reject or transform them.

Please note, you will need to complete some pre-course work on Wednesday 3rd November in order to attend this session. This involves writing down tasks you complete on Wednesday. This will be sent to you on Tuesday afternoon once your attendance has been confirmed.
